

## **Park Info for website**

Perhaps the best kept secret in Forest Hill is our great neighborhood parks which are available to all and are closely tied to the great history of Forest Hill.

**Forest Hill Anglin Ballpark** is located in the 7400 block of Anglin Drive and includes multi-use football, soccer and baseball fields where many leagues hold tournaments. Fields at the facility are dedicated to an early coach and mentor of youth, Wilber Lindley.

**Griggs South Creek Linear Park** which is off Parkwood and Griggs has a vast area which includes a pavilion, playground equipment, restrooms, tennis courts, basketball goals and picnic areas. The pavilion may be reserved for events. A city-sponsored "Fun Day in the Park" is held there annually.

**Emily Trentman Park** is on Leonard Street between Wanda Lane and Twin Oaks and features basketball goals, playground equipment and picnic areas. The Trentman family developed that area and donated the land for the park.

**Leo Spicer Park** is at the end of Carriage Hill Drive and is dedicated to a fallen Forest Hill Public Safety Officer.

**Heritage Park** is off Old Hickory and surrounds the old community center. Playground equipment, picnic area and a paved basketball court are available. The land for the park was donated by Collier-Stephenson Development. The Collier and Stephenson families were early pioneers and that land was part of the Collier farm.

Land for **Hanger Meditation Park** was donated by the Hanger family, early area settlers, and has a picnic area and benches but is restricted from having playground equipment.

**Trailwood Park** is in the 6800 block of Trailwood. It has playground equipment, grills and tables. The developer J. F. Agee left that land for a park when he subdivided the area.

**The Forest Hill Memorial Park** honors veterans, both living and deceased from modern wars and is the site of an annual Memorial Day Celebration. Forms are available at City Hall to have your loved ones names added. That land was donated by Samuel Gene Payte, a Navy aviation radioman in WWII.
